Introduction

Port Phillip Prison is pleased to nominate Rod Boyd - Volunteer, for the Corrections Victoria, Community Work Partnership Awards 2007, Category Seven (7): Supervisor Award.

Rod Boyd

- In 2004 following on from a successful career as a Police Officer, Rod Boyd contacted Corrections Victoria requesting to work with young offenders. Referred to Anne Hooker at Port Phillip Prison's Youth Unit, Rod commenced at the prison as a volunteer and worked directly with the young offenders at Port Phillip Prison. With a keen interest in radio, Rod developed a program for these young men and taught them the skills needed for a career in radio and broadcasting, and which also helped develop their presentation skills.
- Rod's background in the Police force sets him apart from other community volunteers. His experience has also been integral to his approach in working with young offenders. Aware of his previous vocation, the young offenders have been able to work through the barriers and stereotypes often held by them through the work undertaken with Rod.
- Rod is also heavily involved in the Small Business Program in the youth unit and is the General Manager of Community Radio Station STEREO 974,(97.4FM) he has promoted the achievements of this project to the wider community. He has also assisted with developing a website for this program and is a conduit to the community in many ways including his contribution to the radio station's newsletter and as a speaker on community days, where he makes note of the achievements of the young offenders at Port Phillip Prison.
- Rod is always professional and polite; he makes a point of greeting both correctional officers and prisoners on his arrival and when he leaves. Rod is a willing mentor and provides support to offenders during his facilitation of programs and on the outside, sometimes attending court and as a familiar face on their release. Rod is known for his open and frank communication style; he will spend time with a prisoner and provide one-on-one mentoring guidance on how to improve or complete certain tasks, yet at the same time he is prepared to challenge inconsistent behaviour. This has lead to an enormous amount of respect for Rod from both staff and prisoners.

"I met Rod through the Small Business Program that started in the unit in 2005. Rod volunteered to come into the unit in the role of business mentor. Rod runs community based station Stereo 974, and would therefore have an abundance of knowledge relating to the operations of a business. Rod always makes sure that everyone in the program understands what is going on and will continually share his knowledge of various business subjects as they are covered in the meetings. Rod has shown me personally an in depth understanding of the workings of a small business in all facets. Rods talents are not limited to small business, he also encourages people to participate and I would say he acts like a mentor to them and helps steer us in the right direction".
